Swimming and water safety actions for 2024-25:

Currently 16% of the current Year 6 children are not yet able to swim 25 metres. Therefore, we need to ensure that these children are able to access lessons in Year 6 to enable them to swim 25 metres competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres before they complete KS2. From September 2024, children in Year 6 that cannot yet swim 25 metres will:

- Access additional swimming lessons to ensure that all children leave The Discovery School being able to swim 25metres
- The Sports Premium Funding will be used for these additional swimming lessons
- Ensure that swimming lessons continue to incorporate safe self-recue where appropriate for competent swimmers

Review of expenditure 2023/24

P.E leaders at The Discovery School have worked hard with the Leadership Team to develop a strategic plan for using the Government's additional sports funding to improve opportunities for the children attending our school.

The Schools' strategic plan 2023/24, which underpins PE funding expenditure, had four key priorities:

• Increase the % of good or better teaching in PE through quality CPD and coaching support in a range of sports, from leading practitioners, in order to bring about sustainable impact (Key Indicator 3)

Teachers have access to an agreed PE scheme of work, supporting teaching materials. Additionally, some year groups had access to specialist sports coaches to support their professional development in teaching specialist sports.

• Continue to raise standards in achievement forin PE (Key Indicator 2)

Data shows that achievement in PE is at least 90% at the expected standard in all year groups, in PE.

• Increase the % of children in UKS2 that report that they enjoy PE (Key Indicator 1 & 2)

The annual Pupil Voice survey 2023/24 showed that children continue to enjoy their PE lessons.

 Broaden sporting experiences for children via the work of the Sports Leader and lunchtime supervisory team, so that children experience of a range of sports and physical activity during all parts of the school day (Key Indicator 4)

Intensive work has been committed to this target throughout 2023/24. Ofsted reported that provision was 'outstanding' (Report – April 2023).

 Increase opportunities for participating in competitive sporting events via our 'house system' and participation in school sports competitions (Key Indicator 5)

All children participated in the whole school sports day. We also attended sporting events outside of school. Year 3/4 and Year 5/6 tennis teams won both of these competitions. Year 5 and 6 boys' and girls' football teams all Tonbridge and Malling league. A mixed football team was also entered. Key Stage 2 Netball team won the area league.

 Increase positive engagement with PE for all pupils, with a focus on key groups identified through pupil voice questionnaires and PE exit data (Key Indicator 1)

The annual Pupil Voice survey 2023/24 showed that children continue to enjoy their PE lessons.

Increase lunchtime active provision for our children (Key Indicator 1 & 3)

Children are provided with access to a wide range of sporting and physical activities during lunchtimes to ensure children have active lunchtimes.

Additional provision for Year 6 swimming which is above the national curriculum requirements to ensure that
no child leaves The Discovery School being unable to swim (Key Indicator 1)

Children in Key Stage 2 who were not yet able to swim 25m in Year were offered additional lessons. By the end of Key Stage 2, 98.9% of children could swim 25m. Use specialist PE coaching and mentoring for staff to enable high quality teaching of specific sports (Key Indicator 3)

Year 2 had a coach from Kent Cricket to support in the teaching of their cricket sessions. EYFS, Year 3, 4 and 6 all received high quality tennis coaching to support their tennis sessions. A specialist sports coach worked each lunchtime providing a range of sports for age groups.

 Work towards providing all year-round access to all weather sporting facilities (MUGA installation and community facilities) (Key Indicator 1 & 5)

Escalating costs have caused a delay to implementing this specific target. 40% of the funds have been raised, but alternative funding streams will need to be explored to see this project realised.

 Review our current PE scheme to ensure that it enables staff to deliver high quality teaching of specific sports matched to our competition timetable (Key Indicator 3)

As part of the staff questionnaire regarding the current PE scheme of work, teachers reported that they liked parts of the PE scheme, in particular they found the videos beneficial. Some members of staff said they found the lessons a little 'dry'. PE Leads have provided staff with supporting PE material which can be used to make lessons more engaging where necessary.
